

Volunteers Join **Effort To Remove Litter From Local** Waterways



Recently, more than 2,000 volunteers came out by boat, by kayak and by walking coastlines across Martin County to participate in the 2012 International Coastal Cleanup (ICC). Keep Martin Beautiful (KMB) has coordinated the local cleanup for 17 years as part of the larger Ocean Conservancy initiative involving more than 500,000 people in 100 nations around the world.

What sets the ICC apart from any other beach cleanup

effort is the information volunteers collect. Volunteers record specific types of marine debris found, allowing the Ocean Conservancy to compile, analyze and track this data year-by-year and make discoveries about the behaviors that cause the debris. Together, Martin County volunteers have helped to increase public awareness about inappropriate waste management practices along our coasts, effect change in world policies, and convince many to become better stewards of our environment.

"It's very motivating to see volunteers come out year after year to participate in this cleanup," KMB President Rhonda Irons said. "The impact they make lasts beyond the day of

the cleanup, and we're proud to have such a large base of supporters willing to give of their time to improve the health

of our waterways."

With the recent storm activity in the tropics this season, ICC volunteers were bound to pick up some unique finds that washed up on our local shorelines and in our waterways. In past years, unique items such as a king- size comforter, lawn furniture and car parts were found along Martin County coastlines. This year, volunteers came across a DNA test kit, syringes, sheet metal, a propane tank, shingles and multiple toothbrushes while cleaning up various beaches, rivers and

parks throughout the county.

After hours of cleaning and fighting off the rain which started early in the morning, volunteers enjoyed a family-friendly event with face painting, food and drinks, and even a dunk tank at the Volunteer Celebration at Flagler Park in Downtown Stuart.
